Message from Dr. Sutton



I am proud to say this has been a productive year for Health Care Centers in Schools. We always strive to take care of our students and patients, but this past year, with our quality improvement project of increasing well checks, we met that goal within our School Based Health Clinics. We completed 149 more well checks than the previous school year. This accomplishment resulted partly from a renewed

investment in teamwork with increased emphasis on rounding in our clinics and collaboration within our clinical team to see more patients. Through regular, repeated visits to the clinics, our goal as clinical leadership was to ensure that all clinic team members understood the importance and value of their contribution in patient care. I see the increase in well checks as proof of the concept that increased clinic rounding during the school year was an effective and sustainable form of process improvement.

In addition, during the school year 2023-24, Health Care Centers in Schools was able to increase the number of immunizations from 233 to 816. This means more of our students entering each grade did so with appropriate immunizations. These children are now protected from preventable infectious diseases. Immunizations save lives and I am glad we can continue to provide this service to the students in EBR. Our clinics help to improve attendance by offering sick visits, well-checks, immunizations, preventive care and health education.

Above are just two of the many victories our clinics experienced during this past school year. I could not be more grateful for the dedicated service of our clinic teams at our school-based health clinics. Their commitment to our students, the mission of our health system and HCCS continues to inspire me. I look forward to the remarkable outcomes we will achieve during the 2024-25 school year.

Second Annual STI Awareness Week at Northeast High

In April, Northeast High held its second annual STI Awareness Week, with 106 students participating in small groups. The sessions emphasized abstinence as the only 100% effective method to prevent sexually transmitted infections (STIs) and unplanned pregnancies. Students also discussed Louisiana laws regarding age of consent and sexting.

During the event, students engaged in learning activities. They were also given the opportunity to privately request STI testing. Out of those who attended, 37 were tested, and seven received treatment for STIs.

A science teacher brought her anatomy classes to the event, having previously sought the clinic's support in educating her students about STIs. The clinic staff collected feedback from participants to enhance next year's awareness week, ensuring it remains informative and engaging.

A Journey of Resilience and Support

One student's journey with one of our clinics in her school began in 2020 during the pandemic. She presented with an extensive mental health history, including sexual trauma, suicidal ideations, depression, anxiety, grief and loss, along with significant health issues including asthma, muscular and neurological issues. Initially, she received mental health services from an outside provider. However, over time, her health and mental well-being began to decline, leading to frequent falls at school.

The school nurse played a crucial role in discovering the lack of accommodations in place for the student. The nurse communicated with administration, teachers and the student's parent. Clinic staff often assisted the student in getting to class, as she frequently became a target of bullying. Her depression, anxiety and suicidal tendencies worsened, culminating in an overdose attempt. Fortunately, she trusted the clinic staff enough to inform them of her actions, leading to her being sent to the hospital for emergency care.

Recognizing the complexity of her medical and behavioral conditions, the clinic staff referred her to wrap-around services. An Individual Education Program (IEP) was established to address her educational and medical needs, including physical, occupational and speech therapy, along with ongoing outside counseling, medication management and monthly support from a social worker.

Despite her muscular and neurological diseases progressing, requiring her to use a wheelchair, she remains determined to live a normal teenage life, seeking love and acceptance. She graduated in May, a milestone that would not have been possible without the persistence, love and support of the clinic staff and the entire team. Their dedication ensured she received the comprehensive care needed to reach this significant achievement.

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Community Collaboration Brings Healthcare to Families

The community response was overwhelming, with parents and children filling the waiting area and gathering outside. As our team engaged with parents, we discovered many believed their children would receive immediate care. Some children had even missed school in anticipation of a clinic visit.

In response, an impromptu clinic was organized at Glasgow Middle School with the support of the Gardere Initiative, which provided transportation for the families. The clinic team, including Dr. Sutton; Diana Dunton, NP; Tammy Rider, BSN, RN; Kevlyn Colbert; Arnekia Dunbar, MA; Karla Espinoza and Zeila Mitch, saw 21 children that day. Follow-up visits are now being scheduled to ensure these children receive long-term care through primary care providers.

This event showcases the power of community collaboration and the dedication of our exceptional HCCS providers.

At a December 2023 meeting of the Gardere Initiative, the Health Care Centers in Schools team was able to connect with the nonprofit organization's leaders and many of the families they serve.

Our team shared information about Our Lady of the Lake Children's Health primary care and specialty clinics as well as the HCCS School-Based Health Clinics. Our team highlighted the importance of primary care over relying on emergency rooms for non-urgent care. Sylvia Sutton, MD, speaks Spanish and provided an overview of services to the gathered parents.

Over the past year, it has been my great honor to serve the community, students and team members cared for by Health Care Centers in Schools. Through significant transition, the HCCS team remains committed to our mission to ensure every child has the opportunity to learn, grow, and be successful in a healthy and caring environment. This was accomplished through the

dedication and teamwork of our school nursing, school-based health center and community outreach teams creating a seamless entry point to physical, mental and behavioral health.

I am particularly proud of the hard work of our providers and caregivers. Our school-based clinics were busier this year than ever. Our teams provided high-quality, collaborative care for the students and families entrusted to their care. This vital program enabled students across Baton Rouge to attend school daily, free from distracting healthcare concerns.

Our school nursing team provided care to 40,287 students across 76 schools in East Baton Rouge Parish School System and 2,972 children through our charter school partnerships. The school nursing and school-based health center team partnered to implement virtual care options for children who attend schools without a brick-and-mortar clinic on site, which significantly expanded our clinical service availability.

Also, our community outreach team identified a need for healthcare in the underserved Gardere community, formed a partnership with the Gardere Initiative and provided care through our mobile health services to children and families who would not otherwise have access to comprehensive wellness and preventive care. This was truly our team living out our mission to serve those most in need. In this report, we wanted to share some of the many moments of joy seen this year, witnessing the multitude of relationships the HCCS team members have built with students. I am inspired by our caregivers' willingness to give of themselves, both personally and professionally, to make a positive difference in the lives of the young people we are privileged to serve. This work is our mission embodied and represents our calling as members of a Franciscan healthcare ministry.

School year 2024 was a productive year and a year of change at HCCS. I remain firmly committed that the best is yet to come. I look forward to continued growth and innovation in the upcoming year.
